

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Foreword



By Cardinal Michael Czerny S.J. Interim Prefect of the Vatican's Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development We humans are all in relationship with God. God is the Creator and we are creatures whom God creates. When we pray, we pay attention to that relationship, learn about it, grow in it, get reshaped and renewed by it.

In *Laudato Si*', Pope Francis implored and guided us to pay much more attention. We humans should pay attention to our relationships to each other and to all the rest of the created order as well as to God.

Following Francis of Assisi, Pope Francis begins his encyclical with gratitude for all of Creation. The very title is a prayer of praise sung by all Creation for the Creator.

Following science and conscience, Pope Francis begs us to hear "the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor."

Since June 2015, when *Laudato Si*['] was published, millions of people have responded to his plea. People have acted in practical ways to improve our relationships with the earth and with each other. People have also prayed, in both traditional and new ways, for a healthier and more loving world called "our common home". Inspired by the invitation to practice an "ecological spirituality" (LS 216), people are developing new prayers of words and of deeds. Let's all pray.

This booklet shares many lovely prayers and prayer practices. You will find inspiration for how to express:

- exhilaration, awe and joy at the wonders of the nature world
- gratitude for all of nature's gifts that sustain us
- sorrow and shame at how we humans have mistreated the earth and each other and are continuing to do so
- commitment to heal the earth and our

human relationships

Let us pray.

When Jesus responded to the request "Lord, teach us to pray", his suggestion began with these two words: "Our Father". Our father, not my father – a father whom Jesus addressed as *"Abba"*, *Daddy* or *Papá*, not as a remote deity.

Nowadays we recognize Mother, Father, Great Spirit and other ancient and new names for our loving Creator; and now, we understand, more profoundly and urgently than ever, that we are in this together. Our common humanity, not my needs and wishes alone; our connection with all of creation, not my use of this or that resource; Our Father and Our common home. We learn to pray.

The prayers in this book emerge with caring love from the many levels of the

Laudato Si' Movement. The prayers are in fruitful dialogue with Pope Francis's own beautiful contributions: "A prayer for our earth" and "A Christian prayer in union with creation" (p. 4, below), and in the encyclical they come after his own spiritual and mystical introduction (LS 238-46) to read and meditate again and over again.

Let us pray: "Laudato si' mi' Signore -Praise be to you, my Lord" (LS 1).

Introduction

Our work as the Laudato Si' Movement is shaped by our values. We are grounded in faith and committed to spiritual transformation. We *embrace contemplation and action so that we can discern how to act prophetically while living in hope.* We are contemplatives and activists embracing the paradox *of slow and fast rhythms* to respond to the crises we are living. Our values guide us in the challenges of caring for our common home, which is never free from obstacles and frustrations. Accepting these challenges, our values remind us to *care for one another and cultivate unity within the diversity* of the environmental movement, our Church, and our diverse societies and cultures. Truly, we have many wonderful partners!

Along with our synodal process that started in 2019, this Prayer Book emerges from the heart of our Movement. It is the fruit of our united walk, listening to one another and to all the branches that compose the beautiful tree that is our network. Many spiritual resources have been created since the beginning of our journey, but now once and for all we have a compilation of prayers to guide us in our ecological conversion as individuals and as a community that cares and acts for creation.

Through each prayer gathered here you can also hear the different voices that compose our Movement, from grassroots to grasstops, showcasing different corners of the world where our members are active and bringing Laudato Si' to life. This book, therefore, stands not only as a new tool for our continuous work in spiritual transformation for integral ecology, but also as a testimony of our diversity that the Holy Spirit unites.

This collection of prayers serves to lift up all who seek to care for our common home, whether in personal contemplation or shared reflection. There are prayers for gatherings, prayers for retreats, prayers for protests, prayers for the hours of the days and seasons of the year, and so much more.

May these prayers deepen our journey along the path of ecological conversion, and like that great writer of prayers, the Psalmist, may we "sing as we go"

(Laudato Si' 244).

How to use this book

This book is structured into eight parts: 1) Prayers from Laudato Si' 2) Praying with creation 3) Hearing creation's song, 4) Hearing creation's cry, 5) Hearing creation's call 6) Prayers for daily life 7) Creation themed morning and evening prayers and the 8) Laudato Si' Rosary. The best way to navigate through this book is by paying close attention to the index and what each of those eight sections have to offer.

Section 1 - Prayers from Laudato Si'. We begin with the two prayers from the encyclical which serves as the inspiration for our movement, prayers which remind us of Pope Francis' call "to hear both the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor." (LS 49)

Section 2 - Praying with creation includes prayers to frame your encounter with God by listening and praying with creation itself. At the heart of our movement's prayer is praying with creation. Pope Francis, using the words of St. Pope Paul II, reminds us that God has written a precious book, "whose letters are the multitude of created things present in the universe." (LS 85)

Sections 3 through 5 follow the three movements in LSM's Laudato Si' Retreat: hearing creation's song, hearing creation's cry, and hearing creation's call. In Section 3 - Hearing creation's song, you will find prayers to give praise and to give thanks to Creator God. We invite you to open your eyes, ears, and hearts and listen to the song of creation.

In Section 4 - Hearing creation's cry, you will find prayers for a wide variety of socio-environmental problems such as natural disasters, extinct and endangered species, environmental justice, among others. The Ecological Way of the Cross is included in this section.

In Section 5 - Hearing creation's call, you will find prayers for justice, our LSM family and advocacy efforts. If you are looking for inspiration to raise a prophetic voice, you will also find in this section prayers for bold action and prayers for hope and courage.

Section 6 - Prayers for daily life includes prayers to accompany you through the day-to-day. For example, there are prayers for when you wake up, for your family, or for discernment. The Ecological Examen is also included here.

Section 7 - Creation themed morning and evening prayers are centered on the immense gift that is God's creation. There are two prayers for each day of the week to help you start and end your day with the grace of God.

Section 8 - is the Laudato Si' Rosary, with special reflections for each mystery, which closes the content of our book.

We pray that this book supports and inspires you and your community in the journey towards deeper ecological conversion.

Finally, our deepest gratitude to each person who contributed to making this beautiful tapestry. Laudato Si'

Canticle of the creatures

Most High, all-powerful, good Lord, Yours are the praises, the glory, and the honour, and all blessing.

Praised be You, my Lord, through Brother Wind, and through the air, cloudy and serene, and every kind of weather,

through whom You give sustenance to Your creatures.

Praised be You, my Lord, through Sister Water, who is very useful and humble and precious and chaste.

Praised be You, my Lord, through Brother Fire, through whom You light the night,

and he is beautiful and playful and robust and strong.



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Praised be You, my Lord, through our Sister Mother Earth, who sustains and governs us,

and who produces various fruit with coloured flowers and herbs.

Praised be You, my Lord, through those who give pardon for Your love, and bear infirmity and tribulation.

Blessed are those who endure in peace for by You, Most High, shall they be crowned.

Praised be You, my Lord, through our Sister Bodily Death, from whom no one living can escape.

Woe to those who die in mortal sin. Blessed are those whom death will find in Your most holy will, for the second death shall do them no harm.

Praise and bless my Lord and give Him thanks and serve Him with great humility.

Laudato Si' Chaplet

The Laudato Si' Chaplet is a simple prayer technique to pray with creation inspired by St. Francis' Canticle of the Creatures. It is recommended to pray the Chaplet outdoors and with a Rosary at hand. More information on the chaplet can be found at <u>bit.ly/lschaplet</u>

Pray the verses from the Canticle of the Creatures that praise God through the 4 elements and all creatures 10 times each (following the Rosary beads). Namely:

- Praised be You, my Lord, through all Your Creatures x10
- Glory Be and/or Laudato Si' refrain
- Praised be You, my Lord, through Brother Air. x10
- Glory Be and/or Laudato Si' refrain
- Praised be You, my Lord, through Sister Water. x10
- Glory Be and/or Laudato Si' refrain
- Praised be You, my Lord, through Brother Fire. x10
- Glory Be and/or Laudato Si' refrain
- Praised be You, my Lord, through Sister Mother Earth. x10
- Glory Be and/or Laudato Si' refrain

[Optional] A short reflection and sensorial exercise could introduce each of the 4 elements.⁴

Suggested format: You might begin the Chaplet with an introductory song of praise such as Laudate Omnes Gentes or Hallelujah. You might then contemplate creation, spending time in prayerful silence contemplating God's artwork in creation using your different senses. After praying the Chaplet close with an Our Father or another creation centered prayer.

An extended version of the Chaplet could also include the following verses:

- The Gratitude Verses: Thank You, my Lord, for all Your creatures/ Brother Air/ Sister Water/Brother Fire/ Sister Mother Earth.... x10
- The Repentance verses: Sorry, my Lord, for my abuse of all Your creatures/ Brother Air/ Sister Water/ Brother Fire/ Sister Mother Earth. X10

element), to experience God's love through the elements.

¹If you feel called, you could say "Creator God" rather than "My Lord".

²Laudato Si' Refrain: "Laudato Si' mi Signore, con tutte le tue creature" - "Praised by you, my Lord, with all your Creatures"

³For example, spending a few minutes on each of the following. (1) Take deep breaths to become aware of the blessing of Brother Air; (2) then bring your attention to any presence of Sister Water at sight (clouds, river, lake, ocean) or feel the saliva in your mouth and touch your body to remember that we are 70% water; (3) then feel the presence of Brother Fire through the light and/or the warmth of the Suri's rays; (4) lastly, touch Sister Mother Earth with your hands and/or bare feet. Notice how the 4 elements are in perfect balance, as the planet has the perfect amount of each of them to allow life to flourish. Take time for silence (ideally a minimum of 1 minute with each

Communing with creation: Listen, Linger, Love


Here is a prayer to invite you to contemplate creation. It can be done inside or outside.

Linger: Walk or look around you slowly. Notice if some member of creation attracts your attention, a cloud, a tree, a plant indoors. Allow yourself to linger, to pause at whatever attracts your attention and be present to what is there. Use your senses to take in the wonder of this creature: the colors, shapes, smells, textures.

Listen: What might this being be trying to tell you? What might God be saying to you through this element of creation? Consider entering into dialogue with this member of creation, calling to mind St. Francis talking to the birds and calling Brother Sun and Sister Moon. You might ask a question. Then listen. Just be open to what might arise.

Love: When you are ready to leave, find a way to offer love, by saying thanks, offering a prayer to God for this encounter, wishing your new friend well. Find a way to acknowledge the gift you have received and your desire to give something in return.

If there is time, you might try this process of Linger, Listen, and Love with another element in creation. "To contemplate creation is to hear a message, to listen to a paradoxical and silent voice". (LS 84)



Communing ^{with} Creation: A particular place

"The history of our friendship with God is always linked to particular places which take on an intensely personal meaning; we all remember places, and revisiting those memories does us much good." (LS, 84)

If you are indoors, you might try a similar meditation as the one above praying with creation through the imagination.

Recall: Enter into a time of prayer and bring to mind a place in nature that is meaningful to you. It can be a place from childhood, a place visited during a special trip, or maybe somewhere you've never been, but has significance to you.

Imagine the place as vividly as possible, as if you are there right now. Noticing the colors...the textures...the different shapes...the sounds...the smells. Notice also how you feel in this place.

Pray: As you imagine yourself in this special place, ask if there is a message God is sharing with you at this time. Just notice if anything arises.

Give thanks: When you are ready, close by offering a prayer of thanks to God for the gift of creation and whatever message you may have received at this time.



Section 3 - Hearing creation's song: prayers of praise and gratitude

"To sense each creature singing the hymn of its existence is to live joyfully in God's love and hope." (LS 85)

Prayer for courage to speak truth to power





- 3. I ask for the grace to look closely to see how my life choices impact creation and the poor and vulnerable. What challenges or joys do I experience as I recall my care for creation? How can I turn away from a throwaway culture and instead stand in solidarity with creation and the poor?
- 4. I ask for the grace of conversion towards ecological justice and reconciliation. Where have I fallen short in caring for creation and my brothers and sisters? How do I ask for a conversion of heart?
- 5. I ask for the grace to reconcile my relationship with God, creation and humanity, and to stand in solidarity through my actions. How can I repair my relationship with creation and make choices consistent with my desire for reconciliation with creation?
- 6. I offer a closing prayer for the earth and the vulnerable in our society.



Part 7: Creation themed morning and evening prayers

The following morning and evening prayers are a proposal of prayers that follow the rhythm of time and hours, thematically centered on the immense gift that is God's creation. As prayers, they are an invitation to praise God, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, starting above all from the gift of God's creation.

Following the deep monastic tradition, the book proposes two prayers for each day of the week, one for sunrise and the other for sunset. Each hour contains a Psalm, a reading from the Word of God (from the Old Testament in the morning, as a symbol of the dawn of God's work, and from the New Testament in the evening, as a symbol of Christ's redemption when time reached its fullness), an excerpt from Laudato Si', a short commentary, a petition and the Lord's Prayer.



Originally written in Spanish by Fr. Lluc Torcal, O Cist., Procurator General of the Cistercian Order, Spain. If the morning prayer is based on the new day that dawns and the evening prayer on the day that ends, each day of the week wants to praise God for one of the created gifts: on Monday for light, on Tuesday for water, on Wednesday for air, on Thursday for the earth and on Friday for all living beings; on Saturday for human beings, and finally on Sunday for the gift of rest, since it is the Lord's day.

This proposal only aims to help us lead our day together with prayer, a prayer understood as the fundamental nourishment for our commitment to the care of our common home, so that our whole life becomes a true Laudato Si' canticle.

Monday - Light



Morning prayer

In the name (†) of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, Amen

Afternoon prayer

In the name (†) of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, Amen

Psalm 43(42):

- 1. Grant me justice, O God; defend me from a faithless people; from the deceitful and unjust rescue me.
- 2. You, O God, are my strength. Why then do You spurn me? Why must I go about mourning, with the enemy oppressing me?
- **3. Send Your light** and Your fidelity, that they may be my guide; Let them bring me to Your holy mountain, to the place of Your dwelling,

LS 211

There is a nobility in the duty to care for creation through little daily actions, and it is wonderful how education can bring about real changes in lifestyle. Education in environmental responsibility can encourage ways of acting which directly and significantly affect the world around us, such as avoiding the use of plastic and paper, reducing water consumption, separating refuse, cooking only what can reasonably be consumed, showing care for other living beings, using public transport or car-pooling, planting trees, **turning off unnecessary lights**, or any number of other practices. All of these reflect a generous and worthy creativity which brings out the best in human beings.

Small reflection:

Conversion is not real nor true if it does not have a direct impact on the care for our world. This impact is based on small actions that, multiplied by the constancy and conviction of many people, are capable of generating great changes. And these small actions, such as turning off an unnecessary light, are not very difficult to carry out. It is enough to start with one of them: then, the force of habit will make us acquire the practice and these actions will be carried out naturally and will increase in number, intensity and effectiveness.

Petition:

God of goodness, as the day is setting, send your light so that transformed by it we may serve our brothers and sisters and the earth that welcomes us, offering ourselves to their full service through small daily actions capable of having an effective impact on them. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.



Tuesday-Water



In the name (†) of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, Amen

Psalm 107(106):

31. Let them thank the LORD for his mercy, such wondrous deeds for the children of Adam.

32. Let them extol him in the assembly of the people, and praise him in the council of the elders.

33. God changed rivers into desert, springs of water into thirsty ground,

34. Fruitful land into a salty waste, because of the wickedness of its people.

35. He changed the desert into pools of water, arid land into springs of water

36. And settled the hungry there; they built a city to live in.

37. They sowed fields and planted vineyards, brought in an abundant harvest.

38. God blessed them, and they increased greatly, and their livestock did not decrease.

39. But he poured out contempt on princes, made them wander trackless wastes,

40. Where they were diminished and brought low through misery and cruel oppression.

41. While he released the poor man from affliction, and increased their families like flocks.

42. The upright saw this and rejoiced; all wickedness shut its mouth.

43. Whoever is wise will take note of these things, and ponder the merciful deeds of the LORD.



Reading from the Book of Ezekiel (Ez 47, 1-9):

¹ Then he brought me back to the entrance of the temple, and there! I saw water flowing out from under the threshold of the temple toward the east, for the front of the temple faced east. The water flowed out toward the right side of the temple to the south of the altar.² He brought me by way of the north gate and around the outside to the outer gate facing east; there I saw water trickling from the southern side. ³ When he continued eastward with a measuring cord in his hand, he measured off a thousand cubits and had me wade through the water; it was ankle-deep. ⁴ He measured off another thousand cubits and once more had me wade through the water; it was up to the knees. He measured another thousand cubits and had me wade through the water; it was up to my waist. 5 Once more he measured off a thousand cubits. Now it was a river I could not wade across. The water had risen so high, I would have to swim-a river that was impassable. 6 Then he asked me, "Do you see this, son of man?" He brought me to the bank of the river and had me sit down. 7 As I was returning, I saw along the bank of the river a great many trees on each side. 8 He said to me, "This water flows out into the eastern district, runs down into the Arabah and empties into the polluted waters of the sea to freshen them. 9 Wherever it flows, the river teems with every kind of living creature; fish will abound. Where these waters flow they refresh; everything lives where the river goes.

LS 30

Even as the quality of available water is constantly diminishing, in some places there is a growing tendency, despite its scarcity, to privatize this resource, turning it into a commodity subject to the laws of the market. Yet access to safe drinkable **water** is a basic and universal human right, since it is essential to human survival and, as such, is a condition for the exercise of other human rights. Our world has a grave social debt towards the poor who lack access to drinking **water**, because they are denied the right to a life consistent with their inalienable dignity. This debt can be paid partly by an increase in funding to provide clean **water** and sanitary services among the poor. But **water** continues to be wasted, not only in the developed world but also in developing countries which possess it in abundance. This shows that the problem of water is partly an educational and cultural issue, since there is little awareness of the seriousness of such behaviour within a context of great inequality.



Small reflection:

God has created water and created it for everyone. From small springs, water flows over mountains and hills into the valleys to irrigate them and give life. All of life is based on water. That is why access to clean water is the fundamental right and the condition of life on our blue planet. Water is for everyone and it is up to all of us to make it possible that the water we use can once again become clean so that it can continue to give life to all living beings on the planet.

Petition:

God of goodness, You who have made water the source of life in this common home of ours, help us now as a new day begins to transform the deserts of our existence into springs of living water so that we may praise You together with all other creatures. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.



Afternoon prayer

In the name (†) of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, Amen

- 1. Psalm 42(41):
- 2. As the deer longs for streams of **water**, so my soul longs for you, O God.
- 3. My soul thirsts for God, the living God. When can I enter and see the face of God?
- 4. My tears have been my bread day and night, as they ask me every day, "Where is your God?"
- 5. Those times I recall as I pour out my soul, When I would cross over to the shrine of the Mighty One, to the house of God, Amid loud cries of thanksgiving, with the multitude keeping festival.
- 6. Why are you downcast, my soul; why do you groan within me? Wait for God, for I shall again praise him, my savior and my God.
- 7. My soul is downcast within me; therefore I remember You from the land of the Jordan and Hermon, from Mount Mizar,
- 8. Deep calls to deep in the roar of Your torrents, and all Your waves and breakers sweep over me.
- 9. By day may the LORD send his mercy, and by night may his righteousness be with me! I will pray to the God of my life,
- 10. I will say to God, my rock: "Why do you forget me? Why must I go about mourning with the enemy oppressing me?"

Reading from the First Letter of Saint Peter (1Pe 3, 18-22):

18 For Christ also suffered for sins once, the righteous for the sake of the unrighteous, that he might lead you to God. Put to death in the flesh, he was brought to life in the spirit. 19 In it he also went to preach to the spirits in prison, 20 who had once been disobedient while God patiently waited in the days of Noah during the building of the ark, in which a few persons, eight in all, were saved through **water.** 21

This prefigured baptism, which saves you now. It is not a removal of dirt from the body but an appeal to God for a clear conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, 22 who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers subject to him.

LS 235

The Sacraments are a privileged way in which nature is taken up by God to become a means of mediating supernatural life. Through our worship of God, we are invited to embrace the world on a different plane. **Water**, oil, fire and colours are taken up in all their symbolic power and incorporated in our act of praise. The hand that blesses is an instrument of God's love and a reflection of the closeness of Jesus Christ, who came to accompany us on the journey of life. **Water** poured over the body of a child in Baptism is a sign of new life. Encountering God does not mean fleeing from this world or turning our back on nature.


Small reflection:

Just as water is the source of life, God has willed that this same water be the source of the baptismal renewal of all humanity in Christ. Water, together with other natural elements such as wheat, grapes and olive oil, form the basis of the sacraments and, therefore, of the economy of salvation. If they were to be lacking, we would also lack the means by which God offers and gives us His salvation. Saving the destruction of nature, in addition to helping life on the planet, prevents the sacramental doors to salvation from being closed.

Petition:

God of goodness, who through the water of baptism incorporates us into the bosom of Your Trinitarian mystery, never let us lack the water of life and of Your salvation. We ask this in the evening of this day, through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Wednesday - Air



Morning prayer

In the name (†) of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, Amen

Psalm 1:

- 1. Blessed is the man who does not walk in the counsel of the wicked, Nor stand in the way of sinners, nor sit in company with scoffers.
- 2. Rather, the law of the LORD is his joy; and on his law he meditates day and night.
- 3. He is like a tree planted near streams of water, that yields its fruit in season; Its leaves never wither; whatever he does prospers.
- But not so are the wicked, not so! They are like chaff driven by the **wind**.
- 5. Therefore the wicked will not arise at the judgment, nor will sinners in the assembly of the just.
- 6. Because the LORD knows the way of the just, but the way of the wicked leads to ruin.

Reading from the Book of Wisdom (Wis 7, 1-6):

1 I too am a mortal, the same as all the rest, and a descendant of the first one formed of earth. And in my mother's womb I was molded into flesh 2 in a ten-month period—body and blood, from the seed of a man, and the pleasure that accompanies marriage. 3 And I too, when born, inhaled the common **air**, and fell upon the kindred earth; wailing, I uttered that first sound common to all. 4 In swaddling clothes and with constant care I was nurtured. 5 For no king has any different origin or birth; 6 one is the entry into life for all, and in one same way they leave it.





LS 2

This sister now cries out to us because of the harm we have inflicted on her by our irresponsible use and abuse of the goods with which God has endowed her. We have come to see ourselves as her lords and masters, entitled to plunder her at will. The violence present in our hearts, wounded by sin, is also reflected in the symptoms of sickness evident in the soil, in the water, in the **air** and in all forms of life. This is why the earth herself, burdened and laid waste, is among the most abandoned and maltreated of our poor; she "groans in travail" (Rom 8:22). We have forgotten that we ourselves are dust of the earth (cf. Gen 2:7); our very bodies are made up of her elements, we breathe her **air** and we receive life and refreshment from her waters.

Small reflection:

To breathe is to live. Without air we die in a few seconds. And with our actions, we pollute the air that allows us to breathe, that common air, common to all, which makes us all equal among ourselves and in the eyes of God. By polluting the air, we pollute ourselves because we are also air. What strange beings we are that we destroy the very conditions that allow us to live! This eagerness to possess, thinking that we can obtain everything, is what has placed us before the abyss of losing everything, life included.

Petition:

God of goodness, who has made the air we breathe the bellows of life itself, do not allow our actions to turn us into chaff carried by the wind, neither on this new day nor ever again, and inspire us with the necessary intelligence to take care of the air we share. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Afternoon prayer

In the name (†) of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, Amen

Psalm 139 (138):

- 1. LORD, You have probed me, You know me:
- 2. You know when I sit and stand; You understand my thoughts from afar.
- 3. You sift through my travels and my rest; with all my ways You are familiar.
- 4. Even before a word is on my tongue, LORD, You know it all.
- 5. Behind and before You encircle me and rest Your hand upon me.
- 6. Such knowledge is too wonderful for me, far too lofty for me to reach.
- 7. Where can I go from Your spirit? From Your presence, where can I flee?
- 8. If I ascend to the heavens, You are there; if I lie down in Sheol, there You are.
- 9. If I take the wings of dawn and dwell beyond the sea,
- 10. Even there Your hand guides me, Your right hand holds me fast.
- 11. If I say, "Surely darkness shall hide me, and night shall be my light"-
- 12. Darkness is not dark for You, and night shines as the day. Darkness and light are but one.
- 13. You formed my inmost being; You knit me in my mother's womb.
- 14. I praise You, because I am wonderfully made; wonderful are Your works! My very self You know.
- 15. My bones are not hidden from You, When I was being made in secret, fashioned in the depths of the earth.
- 16. Your eyes saw me unformed; in Your book all are written down; my days were shaped, before one came to be.
- 17. How precious to me are Your designs, O God; how vast the sum of them!
- 18. Were I to count them, they would outnumber the sands; when I complete them, still You are with me.
- 19. When You would destroy the wicked, O God, the bloodthirsty depart from me!
- 20. Your foes who conspire a plot against You are exalted in vain.
- 21. Do I not hate, LORD, those who hate You? Those who rise against You, do I not loathe?
- 22. With fierce hatred I hate them, enemies I count as my own.
- 23. Probe me, God, know my heart; try me, know my thoughts.
- 24. See if there is a wicked path in me; lead me along an ancient path.



Reading from the Letter to the Romans (Rm 8, 14-17):

14 For those who are led by the **Spirit** of God are children of God. 15 For you did not receive a **spirit** of slavery to fall back into fear, but you received a **spirit** of adoption, through which we cry, "Abba, Father!" 16 The **Spirit** itself bears witness with our **spirit** that we are children of God, 17 and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ, if only we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him.

LS 88

The bishops of Brazil have pointed out that nature as a whole not only manifests God but is also a locus of his presence. The Spirit of life dwells in every living creature and calls us to enter into relationship with him. Discovering this presence leads us to cultivate the "ecological virtues". This is not to forget that there is an infinite distance between God and the things of this world, which do not possess his fullness. Otherwise, we would not be doing the creatures themselves any good either, for we would be failing to acknowledge their right and proper place. We would end up unduly demanding of them something which they, in their smallness, cannot give us.

Small reflection:

As the air we breathe fills the whole earth, so the Spirit of God, God's vital Breath, is present in all of creation. God is present in nature through God's Spirit, and nature manifests God and praises God's glory. Nothing is hidden from God's gaze, from God's presence, from God's care. The air is that element that best expresses the divine way of being in creation... and, in turn, as the air is unconfined, so God also escapes our will of possession and control. Are we going to let the air, a wonderful expression of the presence of God, become corrupted and hinder it from being the bellows that sustains life?

Petition:

God of goodness, who sent Your Spirit to glide over the waters at the dawn of creation, now that night is coming, send Your Spirit again to renew our spirits and make us discover Your presence and the harmony of all creation. We ask this through Christ, Our Lord. Amen.



Morning prayer

In the name (†) of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, Amen

Psalm 24(23):

- 1. The **earth** is the LORD's and all it holds, the world and those who dwell in it.
- 2. For he founded it on the seas, established it over the rivers.
- 3. Who may go up the mountain of the LORD? Who can stand in his holy place?
- 4. "The clean of hand and pure of heart, who has not given his soul to useless things, what is vain.
- 5. He will receive blessings from the LORD, and justice from his saving God.
- 6. Such is the generation that seeks him, that seeks the face of the God of Jacob." Selah
- 7. Lift up your heads, O gates; be lifted, you ancient portals, that the king of glory may enter.
- 8. Who is this king of glory? The LORD, strong and mighty, the LORD, mighty in war.
- 9. Lift up your heads, O gates; rise up, you ancient portals, that the king of glory may enter.
- 10. Who is this king of glory? The LORD of hosts, he is the king of glory.

Reading of the Book of Genesis (Gn 1, 1-2, 9-10):

1 In the beginning, when God created the heavens and the **earth** 2 and the earth was without form or shape, with darkness over the abyss and a mighty wind sweeping over the waters. 9 Then God said: Let the water under the sky be gathered into a single basin, so that the dry land may appear. And so it happened: the water under the sky was gathered into its basin, and the dry land appeared. 10 God called the dry land "**earth**," and the basin of water he called "sea." God saw that it was good.

LS 53

These situations have caused sister **earth**, along with all the abandoned of our world, to cry out, pleading that we take another course. Never have we so hurt and mistreated our common home as we have in the last two hundred years. Yet we are called to be instruments of God our Father, so that our planet might be what he desired when he created it and correspond with his plan for peace, beauty and fullness. The problem is that we still lack the culture needed to confront this crisis. We lack leadership capable of striking out on new paths and meeting the needs of the present with concern for all and without prejudice towards coming generations.

Small reflection:

The earth is the support of our common home, it is where we should have our feet. Created by God for all, to serve God's project of peace, beauty and fullness of all creatures, we are turning it into a desert, a place where it will not be possible to live. By polluting it, we take away its fertilizing and food-producing power; by desertifying it, we mute its beauty; by heating it, we break the equilibrium that was what made possible the birth of life after millions of years. By what right? If we are incapable of thinking of ourselves, let us at least think of future generations whose future we are mortgaging even before they are born.

Petition:

God of goodness, who created the earth and gave humans the possibility to cultivate it, help us to work in this new morning so that the new generations may receive this earth better than it is currently. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.





Afternoon prayer

In the name (†) of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, Amen **Psalm 63 (62):**

2. O God, You are my God— it is You I seek! For You my body yearns; for You my soul thirsts, In a **land** parched, lifeless, and without water.

3. I look to You in the sanctuary to see Your power and glory.

4. For Your love is better than life; my lips shall ever praise You!

5. I will bless You as long as I live; I will lift up my hands, calling on Your name.

6. My soul shall be sated as with choice food, with joyous lips my mouth shall praise You!

7. I think of You upon my bed, I remember You through the watches of the night

8. You indeed are my savior, and in the shadow of Your wings I shout for joy.

9. My soul clings fast to You; Your right hand upholds me.

10. But those who seek my life will come to ruin; they shall go down to the depths of the **netherworld!**

15 As it is written, "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring [the] good news!" 16 But not everyone has heeded the good news; for Isaiah says, "Lord, who has believed what was heard from us?" 17 Thus faith comes from what is heard, and what is heard comes through the word of Christ. 18 But I ask, did they not hear? Certainly they did; for "Their voice has gone forth to all the **earth**, and their words to the ends of the world."





LS 217

"The external **deserts** in the world are growing, because the internal deserts have become so vast". For this reason, the ecological crisis is also a summons to profound interior conversion. It must be said that some committed and prayerful Christians, with the excuse of realism and pragmatism, tend to ridicule expressions of concern for the environment. Others are passive; they choose not to change their habits and thus become inconsistent. So what they all need is an "ecological conversion", whereby the effects of their encounter with Jesus Christ become evident in their relationship with the world around them.

Small reflection:

Made of earth, from the earth we come and to the earth we shall return. This biblical image speaks to us of the profound unity we humans have with all the rest of creation: our constituent biochemical elements are the same as those that make up the earth, the plants and the rest of the animals. By virtue of that deep unity, not caring for the earth also means harming ourselves. The outer deserts are entering our lives even as bodily deserts: we incorporate the wastes that provoke the outer deserts. All because we live anchored in great interior deserts, alien to the face of Christ who awaits our integral conversion to revive springs of living water in us that can regenerate our interior and exterior deserts. Shall we convert already?

Petition:

God of goodness, do not turn Your gaze away from us this evening nor at any other time so that by looking at You, we who are earth shaped by Your hands may become like Jesus Christ, Your Son and Lord of all the earth and all that it contains. We ask this through Christ Himself, Our Lord. Amen.

Friday - Living beings

Morning prayer

In the name (†) of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, Amen

Psalm 148:

- 1. Hallelujah! Praise the LORD from the heavens; praise him in the heights.
- 2. Praise him, all you his angels; give praise, all you his hosts.
- 3. Praise him, sun and moon; praise him, all shining stars.
- 4. Praise him, highest heavens, you waters above the heavens.
- 5. Let them all praise the LORD's name; for he commanded and they were created,
- 6. Assigned them their station forever, set an order that will never change.
- 7. Praise the LORD from the earth, you sea monsters and all the deeps of the sea;
- 8. Lightning and hail, snow and thick clouds, storm wind that fulfills his command;
- 9. Mountains and all hills, **fruit** trees and all **cedars**;
- 10. Animals wild and tame, creatures that crawl and birds that fly;
- 11. Kings of the earth and all peoples, princes and all who govern on earth;
- 12. Young men and women too, old and young alike.
- 13. Let them all praise the LORD's name, for his name alone is exalted, His majesty above earth and heaven.
- 14. He has lifted high the horn of his people; to the praise of all his faithful, the Israelites, the people near to him. Hallelujah!

Reading of the Book of Genesis (Gn 1, 20-25):

20 Then God said: Let the water teem with an abundance of living creatures, and on the earth let birds fly beneath the dome of the sky. 21 God created the great sea monsters and all kinds of crawling living creatures with which the water teems, and all kinds of winged birds. God saw that it was good, 22 and God blessed them, saying: Be fertile, multiply, and fill the water of the seas; and let the birds multiply on the earth. 23 Evening came, and morning followed—the fifth day. 24 Then God said: Let the earth bring forth every kind of living creature: tame animals, crawling things, and every kind of wild animal. And so it happened: 25 God made every kind of wild animal, every kind of tame animal, and every kind of thing that crawls on the ground. God saw that it was good.



LS 33

It is not enough, however, to think of different species merely as potential "resources" to be exploited, while overlooking the fact that they have value in themselves. Each year sees the disappearance of thousands of **plant and animal species** which we will never know, which our children will never see, because they have been lost forever. The great majority become extinct for reasons related to human activity. Because of us, thousands of **species** will no longer give glory to God by their very existence, nor convey their message to us. We have no such right.

Small reflection:

The immensity, magnificence and greatness of God, are made present to us in the perfume of a flower, in the melodious song of a bird, in the majesty of a lion, in plants and animals created by God, that speak to us of God: they express a reflection of God's infinitude. To exist is to enjoy the great gift of being able to manifest the Being of God in one's own being; and that gives glory to God. Are we aware that, with the extinction of an animal or plant species, in addition to eliminating a creature of God, we eliminate that concrete and unrepeatable form with which something of God was reflected? Protecting natural species is a very high form of caring for our common home. The multiplication of species, willed by God as described in Genesis, helps to spread the praise of God to all the ends of the earth.

Petition:

God of goodness, who this morning invites us to praise You for all the creatures that have come from Your hand, grant that we may unite in this praise the care for all the natural species that have come from Your hands. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Afternoon prayer

In the name (†) of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, Amen

Psalm 104, 1-2a, 10-28 (103, 1-2a, 10-28):

Bless the LORD, my soul! LORD, my God, You are great indeed! You are clothed with majesty and splendor,

Robed in light as with a cloak.

10. You made springs flow in wadies that wind among the mountains.

11. They give drink to every **beast** of the **field;** here **wild asses** quench their thirst.

12. Beside them the **birds** of heaven nest; among the branches they sing.13. You water the mountains from Your chambers; from the fruit of Your labor the earth abounds.

14. You make the **grass** grow for the **cattle** and **plants** for people's work to bring forth food from the earth,

15. wine to gladden their hearts, oil to make their faces shine, and bread to sustain the human heart.

16. The **trees** of the LORD drink their fill, the **cedars** of Lebanon, which You planted.

17. There the **birds** build their nests; the **stork** in the junipers, its home.

18. The high mountains are for wild **goats**; the rocky cliffs, a refuge for **badgers.**

19. You made the moon to mark the seasons, the sun that knows the hour of its setting.

20. You bring darkness and night falls, then all the **animals** of the forest wander about.

21. Young **lions** roar for prey; they seek their food from God.

22. When the sun rises, they steal away and settle down in their dens.

23. People go out to their work, to their labor till evening falls.

24. How varied are Your works, LORD! In wisdom You have made them all; the earth is full of Your **creatures.**

25. There is the sea, great and wide! It teems with countless **beings**, living things both large and small.

26. There ships ply their course and Leviathan, whom You formed to play with.

27. All of these look to You to give them food in due time.

28. When You give it to them, they gather; when You open Your hand, they are well filled.



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**Reading of the First Letter to the Corinthians (1Co 15, 35-44):** 35 But someone may say, "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body will they come back?" 36 You fool! What you sow is not brought to life unless it dies. 37

And what you sow is not the body that is to be but a bare kernel of wheat, perhaps, or of some other kind; 38 but God gives it a body as he chooses, and to each of the seeds its own body. 39 Not all flesh is the same, but there is one kind for human beings, another kind of flesh for **animals**, another kind of flesh for birds, and another for fish. 40 There are both heavenly bodies and earthly bodies, but the brightness of the heavenly is one kind and that of the earthly another. 41 The brightness of the sun is one kind, the brightness of the moon another, and the brightness of the stars another. For star differs from star in brightness. 42 So also is the resurrection of the dead. It is sown corruptible; it is raised incorruptible. 43 It is sown dishonorable; it is raised glorious. It is sown weak; it is raised powerful. 44 It is sown a natural body; it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a **natural** body, there is also a spiritual one.

# LS 190

Once more, we need to reject a magical conception of the market, which would suggest that problems can be solved simply by an increase in the profits of companies or individuals. Is it realistic to hope that those who are obsessed with maximizing profits will stop to reflect on the environmental damage which they will leave behind for future generations? Where profits alone count, there can be no thinking about the rhythms of nature, its phases of decay and regeneration, or the complexity of ecosystems which may be gravely upset by human intervention. Moreover, **biodiversity** is considered at most a deposit of economic resources available for exploitation, with no serious thought for the real value of things, their significance for persons and cultures, or the concerns and needs of the poor.

#### Small reflection:

Diversity in general and biodiversity in particular are an expression of the richness of our reality, of our world, of God's creation. And before understanding it from the point of view of its usefulness, we should value it from its intrinsic reality, from its value in itself. It is from this value itself that the pedagogical value of biodiversity is born, and then its usefulness is possible. In biodiversity itself, we recognize its richness, capable of expressing the glory of God; in its pedagogical aspect,



biodiversity teaches us, for example, how just like a different plant is born from a seed in continuity with it, so will be the resurrection of our bodies in continuity with the present bodies but different; finally, the conservation of biodiversity should be a red line not to be crossed in the new way of understanding the economy that derives from *Laudato Si'*. Do we live our relationship with plants and animals from this perspective?

### **Petition:**

God of goodness, who, on a Friday afternoon like this one, planted the new tree of life, Your cross, to renew the world and redeem humanity, by Your shed blood help us to respect the diversity of Your creation that glorifies and exalts You. We ask this to You who are Christ, our Lord. Amen.

# Saturday - Humankind

# LS 67

We are not God. The earth was here before us and it has been given to us. [...] This implies a relationship of mutual responsibility between human beings and nature. Each community can take from the bounty of the earth whatever it needs for subsistence, but it also has the duty to protect the earth and to ensure its fruitfulness for coming generations. "The earth is the Lord's" (Ps 24:1); to him belongs "the earth with all that is within it" (Dt 10:14). Thus God rejects every claim to absolute ownership: "The land shall not be sold in perpetuity, for the land is mine; for you are strangers and sojourners with me" (Lev 25:23).

# Small reflection:

We came from the earth and we are composed of stardust, from the earth we come and to the earth we return. Our existence is ephemeral. And yet, we are called into existence to enjoy life, the gifts of creation and the Creator. God calls us back to the divine bosom when the earth covers our bodies as we await the final resurrection. We are small and great at the same time, by the loving design of the Creator. We are placed, by God's love, at the heart of creation to be faithful guardians. To guard the earth: this is our mission as God's beloved creatures. Does God's love fill us and challenge us to take care of creation?

# **Petition:**

God of goodness, who at the dawn of a new day calls us back to life, help us to be filled with Your love so that we may be good guardians of the common home You have given us. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

#### LS 99

In the Christian understanding of the world, the destiny of all creation is bound up with the mystery of **Christ**, present from the beginning: "All things have been created through him and for him" (Col 1:16). The prologue of the Gospel of John (1:1-18) reveals **Christ's** creative work as the Divine Word (Logos). But then, unexpectedly, the prologue goes on to say that this same Word "became flesh" (Jn 1:14). One Person of the Trinity entered into the created cosmos, throwing in his lot with it, even to the cross. From the beginning of the world, but particularly through the incarnation, the mystery of **Christ** is at work in a hidden manner in the natural world as a whole, without thereby impinging on its autonomy.

### **Small reflection:**

In order to become a creature, God chose to become human. Christ is the Son of God made human for us and in whom the fullness of the divinity dwells bodily. In this way, all of creation, through the human creature, has entered into the very mystery of God. Not only is God present in everything, but also the creature, in Christ, is present in God. To this extent God loves the handiwork of creation: to the point of renewing it and inserting it into the heart of the divine mystery. Does our love for creation resemble God's? If not, let us fix our gaze on Christ so that we may be converted.

### **Petition:**

God of goodness, You sent Your Son, Our Lord Jesus **Christ**, to redeem humanity and, together with Him, the whole world, help us now that the sun is waning to never cease to look upon Your Son, the true and ever-splendent Sun. We ask this through Christ Himself, Our Lord. Amen.

# Sunday - The day of rest

# Psalm 23(22):

# Reading from the Book of Exodus (Ex 16, 22-26):

Whatever you want to bake, bake; whatever you want to boil, boil; but whatever is left put away and keep until the morning." 24 When they put it away until the morning, as Moses commanded, it did not stink nor were there worms in it. 25 Moses then said, "Eat it today, for today is the sabbath of the LORD. Today you will not find any in the field. 26 Six days you will gather it, but on the seventh day, the sabbath, it will not be there."

#### LS 71

(...) The biblical tradition clearly shows that this renewal entails recovering and respecting the rhythms inscribed in nature by the hand of the Creator. We see this, for example, in the law of the Sabbath. On the seventh day, God rested from all his work. He commanded Israel to set aside each seventh day as a day of rest, a Sabbath, (cf. Gen 2:2-3; Ex 16:23; 20:10). Similarly, every seven years, a sabbatical year was set aside for Israel, a complete rest for the land (cf. Lev 25:1-4), when sowing was forbidden and one reaped only what was necessary to live on and to feed one's household (cf. Lev 25:4-6). Finally, after seven weeks of years, which is to say forty-nine years, the Jubilee was celebrated as a year of general forgiveness and "liberty throughout the land for all its inhabitants" (cf. Lev 25:10). This law came about as an attempt to ensure balance and fairness in their relationships with others and with the land on which they lived and worked. At the same time, it was an acknowledgment that the gift of the earth with its fruits belongs to everyone. (...)

#### Small reflection:

The rest of the seventh day of creation is a pedagogical way in which the Word of God teaches us to live the weekly rest instituted by God. And this day of rest serves above all to remind us of God's lordship over all things: over the earth that has been given to us, over our life, over everything that has come from God's hands. With this day of rest, humans not only regain their strength, but above all recognize the majesty of God in their lives, and they also recognize that everything comes into this world as a gift from God for all. Through this rest arises the need to balance with justice all the relationships that we humans establish during our lives: with creation, with others and with God. Do we live the weekly day of rest as a moment to glorify God's passage through our lives?

#### **Petition:**

God of goodness, at the dawn of this new Sunday, the day on which we commemorate the resurrection of Your Son by which he has renewed all things, teach us to live the Sunday rest, celebrating the gift of Your presence among us. We ask this through Your Son, our Lord. Amen.

Lord 's Prayer. Amen.

The ultimate destiny of the universe is in the **fullness** of God, which has already been attained by the risen Christ, the measure of the maturity of all things. Here we can add yet another argument for rejecting every tyrannical and irresponsible domination of human beings over other creatures. The ultimate purpose of other creatures is not to be found in us. Rather, all creatures are moving forward with us and through us towards a common point of arrival, which is God, in that transcendent fullness where the risen Christ embraces and illumines all things. Human beings, endowed with intelligence and love, and drawn by the **fullness** of Christ, are called to lead all creatures back to their Creator.

### Small reflection:

Human life, like creation itself, is a divine pedagogy so that, through living and walking from conception to death we may learn to love: because love is what we are going to live for all eternity, in that new heaven and earth that will be the fullness of God for us. Sunday rest helps us to taste in time the eternal living in the presence of God. Through this life, along with us walk the other creatures from the hand of God, who, through us, will also be led back to the common Creator. On this day of rest, have we become a little more aware of God's presence in our lives and of the universal communion of all creation?

### **Petition:**

God of goodness, on this Sunday afternoon, teach us to live from Your peace and to give that peace to the whole world. We ask this through Christ Himself, Our Lord. Amen.

Lord 's Prayer. Amen.

# **First Mystery:** The Annunciation

In the sixth month of Elizabeth's pregnancy, God sent the angel Gabriel to Nazareth, a town in Galilee, 27 to a virgin pledged to be married to a man named Joseph, a descendant of David. The virgin's name was Mary. 28 The angel went to her and said, "Greetings, you who are highly favored! The Lord is with you... You will conceive and give birth to a son, and you are to call him Jesus.... "I am the Lord's servant," Mary answered. "May your word to me be fulfilled." (Lk 1: 26-28,31,38).

"May your word to me be fulfilled."

It is the free response of the creature to the gift of the Creator; It expresses availability and openness for the "miracle" to happen through the power, the strength, of the Spirit of God. Creation, the work of the Creator's love, has its natural laws that God himself respects: God does not violate the natural harmony present in His work of love. Only the free will of the human creature, which becomes available to the will of God, makes possible the change in the history of things. Today, the motions of the Spirit of God awaken in us the awareness of having to give a generous "Yes", and sometimes with sacrifice, in order to preserve and care for the harmony of creation. As Pope Francis says:

"... we know that things can change. The Creator does not abandon us; He never forsakes His loving plan or repents of having created us. Humanity still has the ability to work together in building our common home." (LS 13). " ... men and women are still capable of intervening positively. For all our limitations, gestures of generosity, solidarity and care cannot but well up within us, since we were made for love." (LS 58).

Let us, then, be announcers that "a new heaven and a new earth" (Ap 21,1) are possible; bearers of hope, moved by the Spirit; witnesses of change. We have the great example of Mary.

# Second Mystery: The Visitation

"At that time Mary got ready and hurried to a town in the hill country of Judea, where she entered Zechariah's home and greeted Elizabeth. When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting... she was filled with the Holy Spirit" (Lk 1, 39-41).

"She got ready and hurried".

Mary, who lives the experience of the living God in her own being, shows us the essential value of relationships and communication in the dynamism of creation. Natural life on Earth is only possible through the establishment of harmonious relationships and healthy (ecological) communications between each living being and the environment, and between living beings. The Life that drives the dynamism of creation is also transmitted as a spiritual force with the word that is communicated: "He heard the greeting and was filled with the Spirit of God", which is the strength of our strength (see LS 40,28-31).

Pope Francis reminds us that God has stamped the dynamism of the Holy Trinity in all creation, and insists that "everything is connected" (LS 116, 91, 117, 138, 240). ... "This leads us not only to marvel at the manifold connections existing among creatures, but also to discover a key to our own fulfilment. The human person grows more, matures more and is sanctified more to the extent that he or she enters into relationships, going out from themselves to live in communion with God, with others and with all creatures... Everything is interconnected, and this invites us to develop a spirituality of that global solidarity which flows from the mystery of the Trinity" (LS 240).

Let us be like Mary: ready to communicate the strength of God and transform creation.

Third Mystery: The Nativity

Joseph and Mary went up from Nazareth to Bethlehem. "While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger" (Lk 2, 6-7).

The beginning of the Gospel of John gives us a key (Jn 1,1.3.9-11.14):

"In the beginning was the Word... and the Word was God... Through Him all things were made... In Him was life ... The true light that gives light to everyone coming into the world.... He was in the world ... but the world did not recognize Him." Today, we can still accept the Word that is true light that illuminates our consciences and makes us realize the need for a radical change, an ecological conversion towards the respect of creatures, the care of the common home and the most vulnerable and disadvantaged beings of this earth, or, we can look the other way and ignore the reality of things, denying the light of truth (the Word came to his house, and his people did not receive it - Jn 1:11). The first option will be our Birth. The second, our death, which is our option, but condemns.

Pope Francis reminds us: "God, who calls us to generous commitment and to give him our all, offers us the light and the strength needed to continue on our way. In the heart of this world, the Lord of life, who loves us so much, is always present. He does not abandon us, he does not leave us alone, for he has united himself definitively to our earth, and his love constantly impels us to find new ways forward. Praise be to him!" (LS 245). Let the Word get into our history, be born in our consciences, because we know that, despite everything, the darkness does not overcome the light of the Word (Jn 1,5).

# Fourth Mystery: The Presentation

"When the time came for the purification rites required by the Law of Moses, Joseph and Mary took him to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord, as it is written in the Law of the Lord, 'Every firstborn male is to be consecrated to the Lord'" (Lc 2, 22-23).

"As it is written in the Law of the Lord."

In antiquity sin had to do with the rupture: rupture of the relationship between the human being and God, between the creature and its Creator. That rupture has cosmic consequences: the harmony of things is lost. That is the original sin, which Genesis narrates with the metaphor of the loss of paradise: God put the human being in the garden to take care of it and to fill it (Gen 2,15), but the human being disobeyed. That is why for us Christian believers, recovering that link is understood as a new covenant or covenant, made by Jesus Christ. Before Jesus, a way to cleanse one's sins was through purification, through one established rites. Purification therefore cleansed sins, that is, restores you as a "creature to his Creator." Consecrate, therefore, ritually gives back to Him to whom you belong. Purify and consecrate go hand in hand. The consecration has to do with living harmony in creation and with God.

The life of Jesus is a clear example of consecration and purification. Pope Francis reminds us: "Jesus lived in full harmony with creation, and others were amazed: "What sort of man is this, that even the winds and the sea obey him?" (Mt 8:27). His appearance was not that of an ascetic set apart from the world, nor of an enemy to the pleasant things of life. Of himself he said: "The Son of Man came eating and drinking and they say, 'Look, a glutton and a drunkard!" (Mt 11:19) ... It is striking that most of his life was dedicated to this task in a simple life which awakened no admiration at all: "Is not this the carpenter, the son of Mary?" (Mk 6:3)" (LS 98).

We do not need to do great things to consecrate our lives in the salvation of the earth. We need to be like Jesus, to assume his spirituality: living with simplicity, working, enjoying with moderation the goods of the earth and, above all, always recognizing that "less is more" with conviction (LS 212), seeking to restore the just relationships between human beings, the earth and the Creator. This is the ecological conversion that can heal (and save) creation.



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## Fifth Mystery: The Finding Of Jesus In The Temple

"The boy Jesus stayed behind in Jerusalem, but his parents were unaware of it..After three days they found him in the temple courts, sitting among the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions." (Lk 2, 43-46).

"... Among the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions."

Jesus is shown to us as he is: true human (and true God) who needs to learn, to grow, mature, and bear much fruit. You learn by listening and asking others. Again a relationship: learning is a relationship of exchange of knowledge, skills, techniques, culture, art, faith, and so on. It requires simplicity, recognition of who we are with humility (with our feet on the ground), without believing ourselves wise but not thinking that we are worthless. Jesus shows us the meaning of that "humility is walking in truth", as Saint Teresa of Jesus would say.

Pope Francis also shows us that we need to learn from others to make things better. The best example is the first chapter of the letter Laudato Si ': the Pope uses the sciences to understand the damage we are inflicting on sister and mother earth. We do not know everything, and the tools of science can be useful to get a good diagnosis and be able to act with certainty in the best decisions. Denying the scientific data that reveals the state of things, such as, for example, climate change, is closing the possibility of growing, maturing and giving good fruit in time.

The Pope also shows us that science has to allow itself to be taught and learned from other wisdoms that contribute meaning and direction to mere scientific knowledge, if it wants to serve humanity integrally:

"The fragmentation of knowledge proves helpful for concrete applications, and yet it often leads to a loss of appreciation for the whole, for the relationships between things, and for the broader horizon, which then becomes irrelevant. This very fact makes it hard to find adequate ways of solving the more complex problems of today's world, particularly those regarding the environment and the poor; these problems cannot be dealt with from a single perspective or from a single set of interests. A science which would offer solutions to the great issues would necessarily have to take into account the data generated by other fields of knowledge, including philosophy and social ethics... In the concrete situation confronting us, there are a number of symptoms which point to what is wrong, such as environmental degradation, anxiety, a loss of the purpose of life and of community living" (LS 110).

Let us be, then, like Jesus: capable of listening to learn; to ask to grow; and growing, let us mature to give good fruits in his time (and in time, not to be late).

# **Sorrowful Mysteries**

## First Mystery: The Agony in the

## Garden

"The violence present in our hearts, wounded by sin, is also reflected in the symptoms of sickness evident in the soil, in the water, in the air and in all forms of life. This is why the earth herself, burdened and laid waste, is among the most abandoned and maltreated of our poor; she 'groans in travail' (Rom 8:22)" (LS 2).

Jesus carries all our sins, our wounds he suffers because of us, loving us even to the point of sweating blood in Gethsemane: he embraces our sorrow, he saves us and gives His life for letting us live plenty. Mary, Mother of the Church, Help of Christians, stood by her Son in silence. Accepting her offering helps us to live in this world reconciled with God and being brothers and sisters of everyone.

## Second Mystery:

## The Scourging at the Pillar

"...We have forgotten that we ourselves are dust of the earth (cf. Gen 2:7); our very bodies are made up of her elements, we breathe her air and we receive life and refreshment from her waters... The destruction of the human environment is extremely serious, not only because God has entrusted the world to us men and women, but because human life is itself a gift which must be defended from various forms of debasement." (LS 2, LS 5)

Before the battered body of Jesus, the innocent Messiah, who gives himself up for our love, we want to meditate on how much it has cost him, what price he has wanted to pay in his flesh, and what value we will not have for him ... Let's consider that every creature is precious, all life a gift that can not be mistreated. Let us ask Mary, Mother and Queen of all creation, who took him into her virginal womb, to help us to be defenders of life, of human dignity, of respect for every creature, because it is a reflection of the Creator.

## Third Mystery: The Crowning

## with Thorns

"..the natural environment has been gravely damaged by our irresponsible behaviour. The social environment has also suffered damage. Both are ultimately due to the same evil: the notion that there are no indisputable truths to guide our lives, and hence human freedom is limitless." (LS 6)



## Fourth Mystery: The

## **Carrying of the Cross**

"The urgent challenge to protect our common home includes a concern to bring the whole human family together to seek a sustainable and integral development, for we know that things can change. The Creator does not abandon us; he never forsakes his loving plan or repents of having created us. Humanity still has the ability to work together in building our common home." (LS 13)



Contemplating Jesus crowned with thorns, letting his head be shackled, full of humiliation and ignominy, we recognize ourselves in so many moments when we have misused our freedom, damaging our attitudes, creation, relationships, and the environment. He has allowed himself to be humiliated like this, even though he is truly a King, so that by looking at him, we do not forget that we have a Father, that we are his Creatures, not self-referential, but dependent on this love that has created us for our good. With the help of Mary, help from Christians, we want to learn every day from His Hand, to better use our freedom to build a more human, ecological world, where we can live in peace, helping to do it together, our common home where we can truly sing like her: "My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord ....'

Jesus before his death, carries his own cross and ours. He carries everything that we have neglected, left on the road, and with infinite love, faces Calvary, where he knows that his work will come to an end. In this way, he will also let himself be helped by the Cyrenean, in him, his Mother will be, who accompanies him with his gaze and with a firm step, suffering with him, but faithful and firm. Jesus does not abandon us, he carries out his work. And it invites us to walk together, to be able to prolong it in our today, to be able to continue building a civilization where love reigns before hatred, forgiveness before offense, peace and solidarity in the face of destruction and selfishness. Mary, mother and queen of creation, sister to us to be able to carry out with her and like her, this common project of love that her Son began and carried out without losing heart.

# Fifth Mystery: The Crucifixion

"These situations have caused sister earth, along with all the abandoned of our world, to cry out, pleading that we take another course. Never have we so hurt and mistreated our common home as we have in the last two hundred years. Yet we are called to be instruments of God our Father, so that our planet might be what he desired when he created it and correspond with his plan for peace, beauty and fullness" (LS 53).

How wonderful is the certainty that each human life is not adrift in the midst of hopeless chaos, in a world ruled by pure chance or endlessly recurring cycles! We were conceived in the heart of God, and for this reason "each of us is the result of a thought of God. Each of us is willed, each of us is loved, each of us is necessary". (LS 65)

The death of Christ on the Cross, supreme act of love for us, to save us, makes sense. In Him and through Him, all of creation is reborn to new life, and we together with Him. Let us ask Mary, the help of Christians, who stood firm at the foot of the cross, who was faithful to her Son always, to help us to understand so much love and to correspond with our life, at the service of our brothers, and of our sister mother earth, for love of Him.

# **Glorious Mysteries**

# First Mystery: The Resurrection

"As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man dressed in a white robe sitting on the right side, and they were alarmed. 'Don't be alarmed,' he said. 'You are looking for Jesus the Nazarene, who was crucified. He has risen! He is not here. See the place where they laid him'". (Mk 16, 5-6)

At first God created light and separated her from darkness. But darkness was gaining ground until that day, when the Lord's hour came, the darkness spread throughout the region until mid-afternoon. God allowed them the last victory. The darkness blinded with its own darkness, did not realize that they swallowed that which is the true light, the one that enlightens all who come into the world, and thus, deceived, they were themselves darkened and swallowed. The darkness has already vanished and, without knowing when or how, Christ, returning from the dead, has appeared glorious to humanity, like the sun in a serene day. We have been given the gift of the new light, of a light better than that which God had created at the beginning and which was really good: the light that makes the holidays in heaven, the light that is God himself, the light of Christ!

# Second Mystery: The Ascension



"Jesus said to his apostles: 'Teach all that I have commanded you. Baptize them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit...' Then...He went up into Heaven when finally a cloud came and took Him from our sight and we saw Him no more". (Mt 28, 18-19; Lk 24, 50-51)

Sometimes we are in heaven, in the big, white clouds that cover and hide the earth, the sea, and everything that surrounds it. Those clouds that, despite hiding, let pass without hindering, without resisting, subtly, retreating and reoccupying the space that it has just offered to those who go through it. This is our sky, the blue with its white clouds. This was also the heaven that the apostles and the first disciples of the Lord looked upon when they heard that angelic voice that guided them to look towards the earth: men of Galilee, why are you looking at the sky? (cf. LS 64)

Third Mystery: The Descent Of The Holy Spirit

"When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place... They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit". (Acts 2, 1.3-4)

Pentecost is the day of the feast of the fruits. Pentecost is the feast of plenty. It ends along with the Easter time that crowns it: we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit, of the promised Spirit that fills us and brings to the plenty of the Lord. He who was full, because He is God, gives us the gift of His plenitude, of His life, of His love. And this gift of plenitude is the Holy Spirit, Lord and giver of life. From the plenitude of the Lord we also receive the gift of being in plenitude and the gift of living fully. As the book of Acts tells us: "All were filled with the Spirit." Gift of being and gift of life. (cf. LS 80)

# Fourth Mystery: The Assumption

"The most pure body of the Virgin Mary, preserved and exempt from all the corruption of the tomb and raised up to such glory in heaven" (Defining the Dogma, Pope Pius XII)



Mary, the woman who brought the one who "united himself to this earth when he was formed in the womb of Mary" (cf. LS 238), now she carries the same earth to the mystery of God. "In her glorified body, together with the Risen Christ, part of creation has reached the fullness of its beauty" (LS 241). She treasures the entire life of Jesus in her heart: "now cares with maternal affection and pain for this wounded world. (...) Now she grieves for the sufferings of the crucified poor and for the creatures of this world laid waste by human power." (LS 241)

# Fifth Mystery: The Coronation

"A great sign appeared in heaven: a woman clothed with the sun, with the moon under her feet and a crown of twelve stars on her head". (Ap 12, 1)



Mary "lives with Jesus, and all creatures sing of her fairness. She is the woman "clothed with the sun, with the moon under her feet and a crown of twelve stars on her head" (Ap 12,1). "Carried up into heaven, she is Mother and Queen of all creation" (LS 241) The sun, the moon and the stars appear together with Mary as signs of new creation in which Mary participated fully. We are not part of the new creation, but we are part of the first one, so we can not forget to take care of it: "our very bodies are made up of her elements, we breathe her air and we receive life and refreshment from her waters" (LS 2).

# **Luminous Mysteries**

# First Mystery: The Baptism <sup>Of</sup> The Lord

"At that time Jesus came from Nazareth in Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. Just as Jesus was coming up out of the water, he saw heaven being torn open and the Spirit descending on him like a dove. And a voice came from heaven: 'You are my Son, whom I love'". (Mc 1, 9-11)



Without water there is no life: the beauty of our planet would not be so awesome without this wonderful gift; without water there is no regeneration: humanity cannot shine with the beauty of Christ if we are not introduced into the very heart of the Trinitarian life through the water of baptism. All efforts must be made to keep water alive so that God can reach everyone and continue watering our fields and our forests, so that pure rivers flow down! And, without living water, there can not be the living water of the Spirit in our hearts.

Second Mystery: The Wedding <sup>Of</sup> Cana "Wine was gone, Jesus' mother said to him, 'They have no more wine'. Jesus replied: 'Woman, why do you involve me? My hour has not yet come'. His mother said to the servants, 'Do whatever He tells you'. What Jesus did here in Cana of Galilee was the first of the signs through which he revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in Him". (Jn 2, 3-5.11)

The water that is transformed into wine is a symbol of the joint work of God and humanity. Wine is the distillate of water, earth, grapes ... of the natural products that God gives us and of the ingenuity of humanity, also the gift of God, which recreates the created and puts it at the service of humanity when it does He tells us. Intelligence and willingness to work in the world and for the world, intelligence and will to do God's will. And so that wine is not lacking, God asks us to take care of the common home.

## Third Mystery: The Proclamation <sup>Of</sup> The Kingdom

"After John was put in prison, Jesus went into Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God. 'The time has come,' he said. 'The kingdom of God has come near. Repent and believe the good news!'". (Mc 1,14-15)

God's kingdom is the kingdom of justice and truth. In God's kingdom "He shows us just how inseparable the bond is between concern for nature, justice for the poor, commitment to society, and interior peace" (LS 10). The time has come to reestablish the original relations between humanity and God, man and woman, humanity and nature, which sin destroyed leaving on earth injustice and greed that the planet and its inhabitants have exploited since then. The call for a deep ecological conversion is an integral part of God's kingdom (cf. LS 217).

# Forth Mystery: The Transfiguration

"As he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became as bright as a flash of lightning... A voice came from the cloud, saying, "This is my Son, whom I have chosen; listen to Him" (Lk 9, 29.35).



The Gospel of life and light and immortality shone among all of us as material light, of this world, in the form of an explosion that shone like the face of the Lord and that occurs at the beginning of the Lord's ascent to Jerusalem, where He goes to die on the cross. The white, crystalline light invites to not forget that on our path to conversion, we must be only guided by this light of resurrection, because this is a light of truth and life, we can be transfigured and change our face by Christ (cf. LS 217)

# Fifth Mystery: The Institution <sup>Of</sup> The Eucharist



"While they were eating, Jesus took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying, 'Take and eat; this is my body'. Then he took a cup, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying, 'Drink from it, all of you. This is my blood'". (Mt 26, 26-27)

Christ is present in bread and wine. Unnecessary products for human wellbeing were not chosen, but those that constitute its basics. As we have the Communion of this Body and this Blood, how can we allow our brothers and sisters to miss these essential products of human nutrition? Why are the most basic grains for our living at such high prices, making them out of reach for most of the inhabitants of this planet? God's charity encourages us to work for justice and peace on earth, especially for our brothers and sisters in need. Everyone has the right to the bread that renews their strength.
